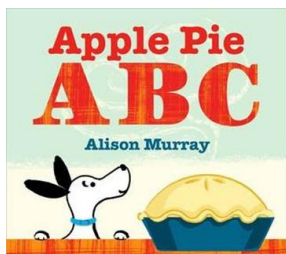


Apple Books

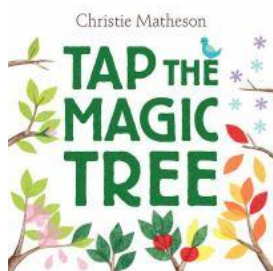
Letting Go by Janet Morgan Stoeke

This interactive story features an apple tree throughout the four seasons. While you do the majority of the action, children will also get a chance for some fun by wiggling their fingers and clapping their hands.

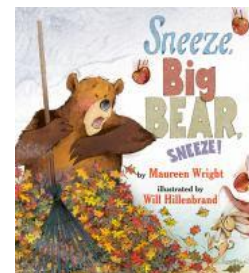
Odd Dog by Claudia Boldt

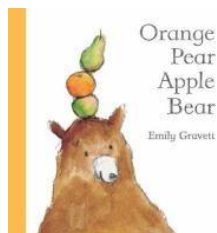
Sneeze, Big Bear, Sneeze! By Maureen Wright
